APRIL MUSINGS

A man took his usual walk along the beach early one morning, but things were different this day because of a storm that passed through during the night. The storm had washed thousands of starfish ashore. As he walked along looking at the storm's effect, he noticed a boy picking up starfish one after another and throwing them into the ocean. "What are you doing?" the man asked the boy. The boy replied, "I'm throwing these starfish back into the ocean so they won't die as the sun rises further and warms the beach." The man observed, "But there are thousands of starfish here. You can't possibly throw enough of them back to make a difference." The boy held up the one he had just plucked from the sand, and throwing it into the water with the others he said, "I can make a difference for this one. C'mon and help me save some starfish."

This is a favorite story and it answers the question of "what difference can one person make" with the answer "it did make a difference to that starfish." The events of the wider world often do feel overwhelming and we wonder what consequence our own actions might have. We all have our moments when we ask: "does it all really matter?"

Consider this. When we make one health/hygiene kit to send to Haiti or Chile or wherever it is most needed, it certainly does matter to the individual who receives it and benefits from its use. And we will never know the recipient. It is given out of faith and received in grace. And this reality keeps the giver from any paternalistic ownership. Does it all really matter? Can one person make a difference? In the Gospel of John, there would have been no feeding of the five thousand without one young boy sharing his five fish and two loaves of bread. And later in that same Gospel there may not have been an Easter story if Mary Magdalene had kept the empty tomb experience to herself.

Does it all really matter? Can one person make a difference? Absolutely! Yesterday, today, and tomorrow! Alleluia! Happy Easter!

WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP – APRIL 19

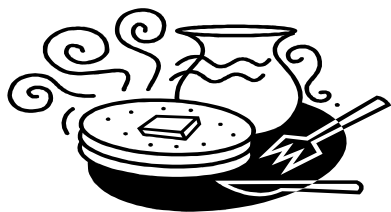

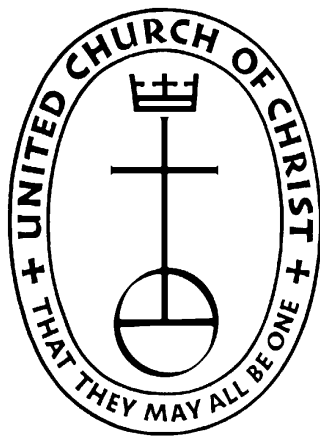

“GOD IS STILL SPEAKING” COMMERCIAL – APRIL 16

The UCC will launch its next "God is Still Speaking" commercial on April 16, utilizing the church's best broadcasting arsenal: its own members. Rev. Felix Carrion, coordinator of the Stillspeaking Ministry, says "We're asking people to set aside that morning for unparalleled texting, Twittering, Facebooking and emailing of this new spot." Called "Language of God," the 60-second video message will be kept under close wraps until introduced at 9 am (ET) sharp on launch day via email, Facebook, and ucc.org. "The power of this roll-out will be our coordinated, yet spontaneous launch," says the Rev. J. Bennett Guess, the UCC's director of communications. "We realize this approach is risky, but it's also fun, innovative and different. Success will depend on broad buy-in. Even if we can enlist our committed core on Facebook, this Stillspeaking message will reach 2,000,000 viewers in seconds. That doesn't count the tweets, texts and emails that every UCC member can utilize to pass this message along. We're asking people to become tech-savvy evangelists. Marketing data now shows that our target audience is now more likely to be found sitting in front of a computer screen instead of a TV screen. Just as we found it important to take to TV in 2004 and 2005, we're taking to the internet on April 16 like no denomination has ever done before."

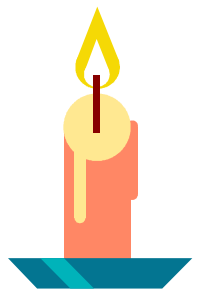

MARCH 8, 2010

Members present: Andrea Ballard, Tricia Kenealy, Kathy Knauff, Cindy Ogasawara, Bill Soderberg; pastor, Tim Devine, and guest, Christina Bogar.

Meeting called to order. Kathy led devotions. Check in. February minutes were reviewed and accepted. – M/S/P

Treasurer's Report

- February was slightly under budget on offerings, building use income, and expenses:

February total income:	\$8,364.10
February total expenses:	<u>\$10,683.21</u>
February deficit:	\$2,319.11

- Year to date for 2010 is better:

2010 total income:	\$22,871.46
2010 total expenses:	<u>\$22,903.22</u>
2010 year to date deficit:	\$31.76

Pastor's Report

- Thanks to Sharon James, Ed Philyaw, and Tim Devine for cleaning and organizing the basement storeroom!
- Tim shared some books he has been reading – two regarding Hurricane Katrina and two as meditations on Black History Month.
 - *1 Dead in Attic* by Chris Rose, a collection of Times-Picayune newspaper columns for two years post-Katrina.
 - *Cooking Up a Storm*, a collection of New Orleans recipes and the stories behind them put together by the Times-Picayune in recognition of the fact that many citizens lost their family recipes in the devastation.
 - *My Father Said Yes*, the story of a Presbyterian minister that accompanied the Little Rock students that integrated Central High School in 1957.
 - *The Long Shadow of Little Rock*, the story of Daisy Bates, an African-American woman who published a newspaper at that time.

Committee Reports

- Christina Bogar reported on the Grounds Committee. Suggested planting trees or other natural barrier in the strips along the parking lot to mitigate people driving over the curb, which is in line with our statement of environmental stewardship and an opportunity to connect with our neighbors. St. Paul's would receive up to 15 trees and one fruit tree. Need permission to cut into the sidewalk on 65th Street and to rent a concrete cutter if needed at the rate of approximately \$55/day. Tim

and Christina will conduct outreach in the neighborhood. Money was authorized, as well as a plan to move forward with preparing sidewalks, procuring and planting trees this fall. M/S/P.

- Tricia reported on her meeting with parish nurse Mary Mueller. Mary is interested in connecting with a church member with a medical background or knowledge to have some input into a project she has involving medical condition cards. She would also like a more regular presence in the newsletter for things such as flu prevention, assisting the elderly, etc. Discussion of using \$100 budget for parking fees when visiting folks in the hospital, and possible attendance at parish nurse conference in Portland, as well as the Eyes to See program and possibility of someone else taking it over.
- Next month, Andrea will report on Stewardship Committee, Kathy will report on Auction Committee (auction is set for October 23), and Cindy will report on Worship Committee.

Old business

- Discussion about post-Katrina fundraiser dinner and whether timing is good. Decision was made to table it for 2010.

New business

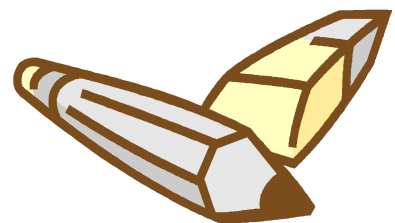
- Becky Withington is a Master of Divinity student at Seattle University and a member of Plymouth UCC downtown. She has met with Tim and has applied to be a student intern, similar to Ann Eidson and Tamara Roberts in past years. The internship involves 6-8 hours a week from mid-September through Easter 2011, preaching every 4-5 weeks under Tim's guidance. With Tim's endorsement, the decision was made to move forward with bringing her on board.
- Tim shared the pre-work for his summer collegium, including a case study and a congregational timeline exercise. The follow-up would involve a member of the collegium staff coming to visit St. Paul's over one weekend within the next year.
