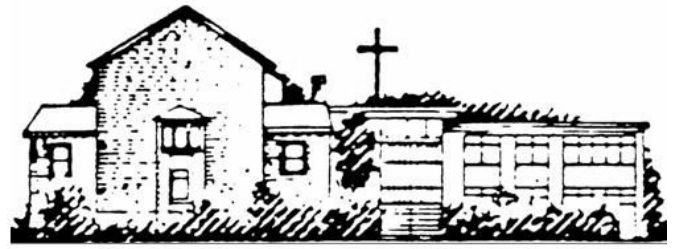

JUNE MUSINGS

For over a month now we have been watching the flow of oil gushing into the Gulf of Mexico from a drilling blowout. Almost forgotten now is that 11 people were killed in that initial explosion. As I read about this unfolding disaster I'm not sure that I can truly comprehend what is happening. I wonder about corporate greed as well as our personal habits that drive the "need" for oil. I wonder about the "drill baby drill" culture that feeds our ongoing denial of the serious environmental issues all around us. And I wonder if we will be entering a before and after "BP" into our lexicon like the before and after "9/11." The wider church has only recently added a theological perspective to all of this, moving from the perspective of the earth's domination to one of stewardship of the earth, recognizing the "God saw that it [creation] was good."

We respond in a variety of ways from prayer to political advocacy, and from challenging corporate greed to changing our personal habits. One place that has been helpful for me with gaining a political and theological perspective is the writing of Bill McKibben ([The End of Nature](#) and other books). I've also found the organization "350.org" helpful. That name comes from science telling us that 350 parts per million carbon dioxide (CO2) is the most we can safely have in the atmosphere. If we want to steward the world God has made for us, that's the number. It can be found online at www.350.org.

In the meantime, later this month David and I will be participating in a Summer Collegium for Small Church Leadership. One of the things I hope to gain from this upcoming gathering is to continue to learn how to lead/guide/teach/manage St. Paul's so that this church continues to be a place where we are spiritually fed and recharged, a place that equips and empowers us to live into a complex and often disquieting world, and a place where – a mantra of my prayer life – we are guided by love and not fear. We all have our different gifts and experiences to share. Blessings along the way!

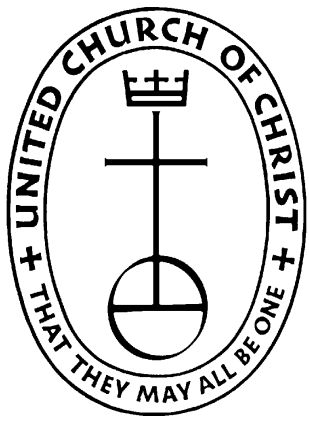

FACTS AND FINDS – From Mary Mueller, Parish Nurse



“OBSERVATION OPTION” FOR EAR INFECTIONS

Since ear infections in children often clear up on their own, guidelines issued in 2004 by the American Academy of Pediatrics encourage doctors to exercise an “observation option.” That means that children 2 years and older who are otherwise healthy can be observed for a short period of time before being given antibiotics. Dr. Richard Rosenfeld, consultant to the American Academy of Pediatrics on ear infection guidelines, stressed that “observation is different than no treatment.” While watching and waiting over a period of one to three days, the focus would be on pain relief. A child with a fever of 102 or more would typically be treated. A study reported in the British Journal BMJ in July found that ear infections come back more often in kids who’ve been treated with antibiotics. The hope is that someday kids might be vaccinated against ear infections. Until then, Dr. David Tunkel, Director of Pediatric Otolaryngology at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine, recommends that parents take some simple measures to reduce the likelihood of ear infections, an example of which would be to choose a day-care setting with as few children as possible.

Even more exciting for us is that currently there is a bill that just passed the lower house in Argentina and is now in the senate to allow for legal same sex marriage. We will carry through with our plans either way.

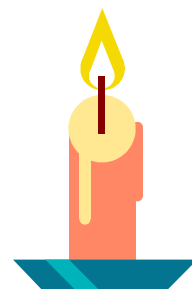

GODS LOVE KNOWS NO BORDERS

This is a copy of the full page advertisement created by the national setting of the United Church of Christ, paid for by individual donations, and to be printed in the Arizona Republic newspaper on May 29, 2010. "Across the church, we have heard eagerness that the United Church of Christ respond publicly in Arizona with a message that resonates both pastorally and prophetically to this unjust new law," says Rev Geoffrey Black, General Minister and President. The UCC also plans similar ads in Spanish language publications and the development of a viral video message that will be used to combat similar measures now being proposed in other state legislatures.

"It is now legal for Arizona's law enforcement to single people out because of the color of their skin, the language of their ancestors, their place of employment, or even the way they dress. When racism raises its ugly head and our nation's core justice values are at stake, fear cannot be an excuse to remain silent."

Now, we will stand with you until this hurtful law is repealed.

Through its national General Synod, the United Church of Christ has called for comprehensive immigration reform that resists scapegoating and protects the rights of all who reside in the United States — a policy that understands the root reason for mass migration is found in the economic, environmental and trade inequities that exist between the United States, Mexico, and all of Latin America.
